<p>FLACRA report</p>	<p>Lynn informed that she and some peer counselors were finally able to make a presentation to PYMS students during their health classes addressing experimentation and abuse of drugs from athletic injuries. PYMS Principal sat in on one of the presentations and said it was the best they had ever had. Kids were abuzz about it, going home and talking to their parents. Parents have written letters of thanks. Dale is getting phone calls from families. They are negotiating to have a peer in the building for 4 hours weekly. They hope this positive reception will get them into the Academy. Lauren will send emails to DCS officials to see if they will welcome this presentation and outreach in their school</p> <p>In addition, Billy McMarty has now got the Family Navigator program up and active. Katy Gregory will be taking over the Peer Supervision program. An RN has been hired for the mobile health unit and telehealth equipment has been purchased.</p>
<p>YSAC Report</p>	<p>Patty & Doug attended.</p> <p>Targeted Regional Permanency Center (TRPC) Coordinator, Dori Shaner, from Catholic Charities, distributed info to let us know what services are offered for residents of Ontario, Seneca, Yates, Wayne and Orleans Counties.</p> <p>“Hidden in Plain Sight” is a youth demonstration bedroom with clues that a youth might be getting involved in substance abuse. The materials were purchased with a grant by OASAS. It will be set up for members to view at the next full coalition meeting. Mike distributed a flyer about it and invites anyone who might like to sponsor it for their organization to attend the March meeting. There is a cost associated with making it available.</p> <p>2018 Work Plan Mike drew our attention to the 2016 Youth Survey data. Using it, what can we do to make a difference? He provided a sample “logic model” and a blank model form for us to use as we consider what we would like to accomplish and how.</p> <p>24/7 Open Access Centers Mike noted that in the Governor’s proposed budget \$4 Million is earmarked for this, possibly in Wayne Co. and that \$274 Thousand is earmarked for Care Compass Network of SAY2R.</p> <p>12 Community Sectors for Coalition Building Mike also had this for all to consider. What do we have? What is missing? What would we like? Representatives are to take it to their subcommittees for possible answers.</p>

Spend Coalition money for transportation	<p>Doug never got to present this at the full YSAC meeting. County Legislator Carlie Chilson (Milo) (a fresh pair of eyes) wondered if we had considered the accompaniment of a minor in our proposal. With this in mind, we amended our proposal to read:</p> <p>“A onetime offering of Coalition funds, not to exceed \$500/client for ground transportation to a facility in the North East of the US, be made available, on the recommendation of a professional provider, to a client who has documented need and is seeking treatment at an inpatient treatment facility, for which no other transportation funding is available. If the transportation is by bus or train, the money would cover the cost of a ticket* to the location of the bus/train station closest to the facility, and cab fare.* When the treatment is done, and the person* seeks to return, funds for that portion of transport can be given. *If the client is a minor, needing the escort of an adult, the funds would cover the cost of transport of the client and round trip fare of the escort. If done by private vehicle, the cost would cover any tolls, the delivery and pick up of the client when being admitted and discharged, respectively. For non-public transportation, the actual amount given would cover tolls and mileage. Mileage would be tied to the Federal reimbursement rate, and based on each round trip. Using a map service (Like Google Maps or Mapquest) and toll calculator, half of the roundtrip amount could be released to get the client to the inpatient facility. The remaining half would be given upon the driver’s return. Drivers could be from the client’s family, or a volunteer. In 2018, the amount available for emergency transportation cannot exceed \$1,000, in aggregate.”</p> <p>Ms. Chilson also questioned who the professionals are. It was decided to ask George Roets, Deb Minor and FLACRA to provide a list of mental health and medical professionals.</p>
Subcommittee’s purpose	<p>Doug was never able to request an evaluation of all subcommittees work at the full coalition meeting. We wonder if our mission may be over, however. We feel that FLACRA has done such a great job of devising what is needed, seeking funding, putting programs in place and working with hospitals and law enforcement so that those points of contact know who to call. Is it time to combine with the Education and Outreach subcommittee? Per the YSAC 2/21 agenda, their next meeting is 2 PM on 3/21.</p> <p>Patty presented about Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs). Using a series of 10 questions, a person’s response would indicate if there is enough childhood trauma to predict the likelihood of substance abuse or major health problems as adults. A segment about this was done recently by CBS’ 60 Minutes: (https://www.cbsnews.com/news/the-life-changing-story-oprah-reports-this-week/) Developing positive relationships and working with a counselor are the keys to recovering from ACEs.</p> <p>Doug noted that most of the people he has visited in jail have indicated that childhood trauma and poor father relationships were mitigating factors in their troubled adult lives. Perhaps our mission is not yet done. Perhaps we need to approach Human Resource offices of businesses in Yates County to ask them to do an in-service with a counselor from Family Counseling Services of the Finger Lakes to explore ACEs.</p> <p>In addition, we are to address the 12 Community Sectors for Coalition Building template Mike provided on 2/21.</p>
New Business	
More Education for Employment in Trades?	<p>Ms. Chilson suggested that a “View Day” at BOCES might be helpful. We, as a society, have focused for too long on preparing all students for college. Now we have a need for people in the trades. College students may also be helpful in giving an overview of the strenuous demands of higher education.</p>
